Crime On December 10, 2010 in Harris County, Texas a man was stabbed to death.

Evidence A knife was found in Lydell Grant's vehicle, and was swabbed and sent for DNA analysis. Fingernail clippings were taken from the victim during the autopsy and submitted for analysis as well.

DNA The Houston Police Department Crime Lab was unable to develop a profile from the DNA mixture on the swabs.

Match Grant could not prove his innocence. He was convicted of murder, and ordered to serve a life sentence.

TrueAllele In March of 2019, the DNA data was reanalyzed using TrueAllele. Within a week, the match statistic that was produced excluded Grant as the killer. Using a TrueAllele genotype from the same DNA data, a CODIS search was performed and found a match to the true killer.

Cybergenetics Dr. Perlin and the company worked closely with Grant's defense team to get the case overturned.

Outcome Lydell Grant was released on bond on November 26, 2019.
